Knapton Millennium Field Update

As residents are likely aware, Victory Housing have been proposing to develop 16 two story houses on Knapton's Millennium Field. The Plans were submitted and people were asked for their opinions to be sent to

North Norfolk District Council by January 12th. A meeting with local residents was held in the Village Hall where the Parish Council gauged opinion. Over 80 residents attended and voted unanimously to reject the plans as they stand. A letter highlighting Villager's concerns (which can be found on the Knapton Village website) was then drafted by The Parish Council and sent to The North Norfolk District Council, NNDC also received over 85 letters of objection and one letter of approval about the development from local people. A negative report was also submitted by the Highways Department which advised that in their opinion the development should not go ahead due to road safety issues. The chief Planning

Officer has subsequently refused the plans but we have just learned that Victory are now going to submit new ones and have asked for more time to amend their application, NNDC have given them until May 17th. Victory say they are reducing the number of houses to 14, improving the design of the houses, and reducing the visual impact on the village. If this is then approved by the Planning Officer it will then go to a committee of elected councillors the names of which can be found opposite, if residents wish to lobby.

Knapton Parish Council Update

The Parish Council meet regularly on the first Tuesday of every month in the Village Hall at 7.30 pm and welcome all Knapton residents to attend the meetings. For a full list of Councillors and their contacts can be found on the Knapton village website.

The main focus for the past few months has been the development of the Millennium Field which is already covered in this newsletter but that doesn't mean councillors haven't been busy with other village issues. In March an annual donation of £200 was agreed by Councillors to contribute towards the upkeep of the Churchyard, An

annual fee was also agreed for the mowing of the Knapton to Mundesley footpath, and a call for volunteers to run a village instagram account was discussed. The date of the next meeting is Tuesday 3rd April.

The Trunch group of Parishes has been busy of late with various groups existing and newly forming, that are taking place in All Saints' Community Rooms in Mundesley. The Baby & Toddler Café (every second and fourth Friday 9.30-11.30am) goes from strength to strength with ever more new little arrivals boosting the numbers. The parents also enjoy getting involved socially and with the singing and extensive craft activities.

Soup n Pud is another favourite on the first Friday of the month 12-1pm, boasting 4 homemade soups and puddings from Dez our chef for a mere £5 for all you can eat – and a free raffle ticket! 
The Big Freeze of 2018

The village of Knapton almost came to a standstill at the end of February as Storm Emma, also known as "The Beast From The East "bought much snow and wind from Russia to the whole of The United Kingdom. Villagers pulled together and those with suitable vehicles organized runs to the supermarkets and residents checked up on their more vulnerable and elderly neighbours.





Farmer, John Claydon was kept very busy helping pull cars out of snowdrifts with his tractor , and whilst Councillors Alan Young, Andrew Claydon and David Rowntree gritted Hall Lane, Councillor Pat Lee put salt down on Lawn Close and Loraine Holtham worked hard on the clear up of St. Peter's Close. Many more people who remain unnamed here are to be thanked to for keeping Knapton as "open" as it could be.



Some residents could be entitled to a £25 cold weather payment from the Government as the temperatures reached below zero degrees celsius for over seven days in a row. People who may be

eligible are the who claim pension credit, income support and universal credit and should expect to receive the payments automatically on their statements within the next few weeks.

KNAPTON VILLAGE LIFE IN THE 1940'S

I was born in 1942 in Halifax. I don't remember the war itself. But I do remember its aftermath in an industrial town. I wondered what the forties were like in Knapton, so I asked Reggie Smith who was born in South View, in The Street. After he married Pat they moved to the bungalow on the North Walsham road and have lived there ever since. He is ten years older than me, but doesn't look it.

Imagine, for a start, the 1940's Knapton without any bungalows or newish houses. The people who lived in this agricultural village worked in it. Although the late Henry Wilde at one time cycled each day to Bawdeswell near Reepham to work as a carpenter. Virtually nobody had a car. There was no petrol anyway during the war. The fields and pasture around and in the village were for cattle and pigs, as well as arable. Horses were used for ploughing and carting corn. What is now Lawn Close was grazing pasture, full of trees. Cattle were driven all over the place.

Reggie went to Knapton School in Hall Lane which educated children in two or three classrooms aged from 5 to 14. During the war evacuees were billeted here and school numbers went up. Paston children went to Edingthorpe School (in the middle of nowhere) or Mundesley school. Dr Taylor of North Walsham was the village doctor. And of course in those days the doctor did home visits.

Mains water came to the village in 1946. Before that the tin bath hung outside and bathtime meant boiling the water on the copper. The copper was the tank alongside the wood or coal burning cooking stove in the living room. All houses used well water which was not always crystal clear. No lavatories at that time. Outside privies, buckets and the night soil man prevailed, as they had for hundreds of years.

Two policemen lived in police houses in Mundesley, and would majestically ride to Knapton and survey the scene, at length from four cross ways. The fire brigade was in Mundesley, but was rarely needed here. There was no pub in the village, and Knapton Hall was an hotel. Groceries, fresh meat (from Southrepps) and fish were delivered by men in vans who took orders for next week when they came.

Reggie's mother at South View was the postmistress, and so part of South View was the post Office and a small village shop, with a telephone kiosk outside. Very few houses had their own phones. During the war a large military radio van parked outside her shop. No one quite knew what it did. There was another shop beside the village hall. Mr Bussey the blacksmith had his smithy at what is now called Chorley Rick in The Street.

The war was rather exciting for a boy. The beach was out of bounds because it was heavily mined (by the British of course). Along the top of the cliffs were high poles with rope strung between them to deter German gliders. There was an anti tank spigot mortar emplacement at the top of The Street, like the two similar ones you see on the left as

you come in to Walcot from Stalham. Reggie buried the remains of it not that long ago. Outside Verbena Cottage, where John Bean the bullock feeder lived, there was a tank trap at the ready. Holes were dug in the road and a six foot high metal contraption was readied to drop in to them when panzers threatened to come up The Street.

There was an anti aircraft searchlight in the fields at Edingthorpe. Reggie's father was once out rabbiting by night, the light came on and he had to lie literally low for a while. Sometimes there were so many, mainly American, aircraft flying East over Knapton to bomb Germany that they extended over all the horizons. German aircraft came the other way over Knapton to bomb Yarmouth whilst young Reggie watched. The gap in the hedge just beyond the Elephant Barn and on the opposite side of the road was caused by a German land mine that was dropped too low, so it went off. Otherwise landmines were dropped by the Germans by parachute and sat around till someone touched them .

The railway line ran from Norwich / Walsham / Knapton / Mundesley / Trimingham/ Cromer / Sheringham / Holt / Fakenham and back to Norwich. It was always on time. The station master at Knapton was Elijah Coe resplendent in his black suit and peaked hat. Knapton station was busy. For it took lots of freight like potatoes, sugar beet and corn. Jack Lark of Edingthorpe had his coal yard there. Workmen working on the tracks used little metal explosive devices which went bang when a train was coming and ran over them so the men could get out of the way. The railway embankment was always smothered in primrose. It is a shame Mundesley Station was demolished. It was a lovely building, and, in its day, a lovely station.

If Tom Purdy of Green Farm bought bullocks from Trowse market they would be driven on the main road to Knapton. It took two days, with an overnight stop in Coltishall.



Knapton Women's Own Charity of the Year Cromer Hospital & Community Friends

Knapton Women's Own would like to thank all of you who support our fundraising initiatives. You enabled us during 2017 to raise £700 for WaterAid. To quote the WaterAid letter of thanks:

"The day you gave this gift is the day you helped bring the big day closer. The day when the whole world has clean water and a decent toilet".

Our charity for 2018 is nearer to home - Cromer Hospital and Community Friends.

As some of you will know, Cromer Hospital is about to embark upon a new project to provide a Medical and Cancer Unit for our area. The 'new' wing (pictured above), which was part of the original Cromer Hospital, will be used for cancer patients and chemotherapy treatment. The unit will serve around 10,000 new patients a year and will free up space in the central hospital so that a further 600 surgical procedures a year can be carried out in dermatology, urology, vascular surgery and pain management. There will be six treatment chairs plus space for three new clinic rooms and two new minor procedure rooms.

The project, which will cost £.18 million, is due to be completed in Spring 2019. The project funding is already in place. However, additional monies will be required for various pieces of equipment and Cromer Hospital and Community Friends will be very involved in helping to provide this funding.

We hope you will help once again by contributing to our fundraising efforts and in particular join us for our Strawberry Tea in Knapton Village Hall on the afternoon of Tuesday 3 July.

We are always delighted to welcome new members to Knapton Women's Own. We meet at 2.15 p.m. on the first Tuesday of each month in Knapton Village Hall. There is no membership fee.
