Knapton Parish Clerk's Report: July 2021

This month Cally Keohane gave a very interesting and informative talk about Highways and is very kindly coming back to continue. Thank you Cally.

You may have seen the 30mph speed restriction has now been extended down Hall Lane to Butterfly Walk. This is as a result of very hard and persistent work by Peter Neatherway, who is also chasing a speed restriction on the B1145 from Mundesley to Knapton and Knapton to Swafield and trying at the same time for one in Pond Lane. Re-shaping of the junction at the top of The Street, remains on the menu, but Highways have few people who can do this work, so it will be a while.

The car park is now owned by the Knapton Parish Council and Peter Neatherway and Pat Lee have been up with their watering cans giving encroaching weeds a hard time.

There have been problems in the village with people not picking up after their dogs. A particular area affected is on the allotments, where dogs are not supposed to go. This is an unpleasant habit and signs (thank you Peter Neatherway) will be posted at strategic points in the village. A new dog waste bin has been put in Hall Lane near the entrance to the car park.

The Parish Council has also agreed to have a textile bin situated at the edge of the car park. NNDC does pay for textiles collected, so it is hoped it will add a little to village funds.

County Broadband is on track to go ahead with installing fast fibre broadband in the village. Some of you will have had visits from them. They are to do a presentation in Trunch, which you will be welcome to. Date to be advised.

Dog Fouling



As many will know from my comments on the Knapton Facebook page, dog owners allowing their dogs to mess on our streets, pavements, paths and green areas without clearing it up has noticeably increased, most recently at the MADRA. This is despite there being dog waste bins around the parish including a new one that we've just installed by the car park in Hall Lane.

This crime is not only deeply unpleasant, it is dangerous. Viruses and diseases such as Coccidia and E.coli can be spread in dog poo which can pass onto humans, especially children, in prevailing poo areas such as woods and parks. Whilst rare, contact with dog excrement can also cause Toxocariasis – a nasty infection that can lead to dizziness, nausea, asthma and even blindness or seizures.

What is going through people's minds to make them think that allowing their dogs to mess in a public area without clearing it up is OK?

To make it very clear, it is a legal offence for a dog owner not to clean up after their dog in any public space. Failure to do so can result in a fine of up to £100. Failure to pay the fine can result in prosecution through the court and if found guilty that fine can rise to £1000. Only those registered as Blind are legally exempt.

Since the main responsibility of the Parish Council is to keep our residents as safe as we can, we have adopted a zero tolerance policy and have taken steps to catch those law breakers using a variety of means, including cameras. These will be sited at various locations around the parish and moved from time to time, for the specific purpose of catching those thoughtless people who commit this disgusting and completely avoidable crime. The first one is already operating.

Unless they stop, it is only a matter of time before we catch an offender and we WILL name and shame them on social media and we WILL exact the maximum penalty of a £100 fine, rising to £1000 if prosecution is required, in ALL cases.

Knapton Parish Council Chairman's Statement - August 2022

Hi everyone

I hope that everyone is coping with the recent soaring temperatures in our little corner of paradise. But although it's nice to have such a warm summer, the extraordinary heat is causing problems for some of us, so may I ask that if you live close to any of our elderly or disabled residents please find the time to check on them just to make sure they are OK and that they don't need anything. And for those who can't get out to get what they need, please remember that the Knapton Angels are still very much ready to help if need be.

Another downside of the prolonged heat spell is the risk of fire and as many of you will know a fire ripped its way across around 18 acres of our local farmers fields a short time ago. It's only because the wind didn't change direction that homes on Knapton Green and Wilds Way did not suffer a major disaster and a real danger to life. As it is, Steve Hammond and Mr Cargill suffered tremendous - and very expensive - damage to their fields and crops through the unbelievably thoughtless actions of someone who thought it would be a good idea to light a bonfire amongst trees on the hottest day in recorded history!

There is an increasingly serious problem of dog's mess not being cleared by their owners. Please read the separate article that I've written in this edition of the Knapton News regarding this issue and what the Parish Council is doing about it.

Over the last few months, I have been negotiating with NNDC to receive trees and hedging to plant around the parish, mainly to replace plants lost for various reasons and I'm hoping to have some available for those who need just a few, to collect at an open day in the Village Hall. Assuming I'm successful I'll let everyone know what's available, and when, closer to the time.

Councillor Liz Winter has done a fantastic job liaising with Anglian Water, who in turn have done a fantastic job of progressing well with the installation the village's first mains sewerage system. The Anglian guys have been amazing in their attitude towards minimising inconvenience and helping where they can, even offering first aid to one resident who fell over when he was no where near their works. They have gone well and truly above and beyond, and we owe a huge debt of thanks to all involved.

A few weeks ago, I met with a dozen or so local residents to discuss the possibility of resurrecting the Knapton History Club, including Gillian Shephard who many of you know and grew up with. Discussions are ongoing as to the format but if anyone else is interested in knowing more about our village's past, please let me know.

I'm often asked about getting the speed limits around the village reduced to improve the safety of our roads. To get a speed restriction agreed by County Highways the road has to meet certain criteria. However, there is a window of opportunity coming up in a few months which may allow us to bypass these restrictions and we are working with Mundesley and Swafield to try to get the speed limit reduced along the Knapton Road. We are also trying to apply the same moratorium to Pond Lane and get a speed limit of 30mph agreed. For all those concerned I promise that we will do our best to get it done but please remember, even if we are successful it may take another year or two to implement, such is the timescale of Highways projects.

On the subject of highways projects, the agreed re-modelling of the junction of Hall Lane and Knapton Road can progress once Anglian Water have completed their works. Although I got this agreed three years ago we are still waiting and I will not stop until it's done.

And some good news, the famous Knapton Fête is back on the 4thSeptember, starting at 2pm. This is always great fun for all the family and my fellow councillors and I are looking forward to meeting everyone there.

Stay safe and remember that the Parish Council is always here if you need us.

WE ARE INVESTING IN FIRST TIME SEWERAGE IN KNAPTON

This £3million investment scheme will provide properties in Knapton with a new sewerage system, allowing residents to have the opportunity to connect to mains sewerage for the first time.

We're installing a brand new system, helping to reduce pollution in the neighbourhood

What we have done so far!

We've completed the installation of our pumping station, including the new layby. Fencing will be installed in the next few weeks and in September we'll plant the hedging to provide screening to the station.

We've installed over 1.3kilometers of the collection pipe, 18 manholes and 36 lateral connection points. Construction of the new sewer on Knapton Road, west the B1145, is now complete and all laterals have been fitted.

What happens next?

We're currently working on The Street and expect to be finished by the end of September . After this, we'll move to Mundesley Road, until the around the end of October. Our teams are also working on Lawn Close and expect to finish the section in the next six weeks. Following on from this, we'll move on to Paston Road where our closure will be in place until the end of September.

Before you complete your private connection, you must apply for a building control inspection through the council. This must be done before any work starts.

Report from Ed Maxfield County Councillor for Knapton

I reported lots of important local issues in my August report to Parish Councils. Here are some of the highlights.

Fire Safety

Norfolk's Fire Service has been <u>criticised in an official report</u> for its work on fire prevention. The Fire Service has only limited powers to enforce fire safety measures and those only apply to buildings, not to crops or haystacks etc. The Service is looking at ways they can involve the community in spotting and tackling fire risk and I will stay in touch with them (and you) on the issue. The challenge is only likely to get bigger in coming years.

It is important to pay tribute to the work that the Fire Service did in response to the recent heatwave. You can read the incident reports I received from the County Council on my website.

Cuts to the mobile library service

Norfolk County Council is consulting on cuts that would halve the budget of the mobile library service. You can read the County Council's press release and have your say through the <u>consultation here</u>.

Trunch Post Office

Trunch Post Office is sadly closing at the end of August. Post Office Ltd is now consulting on how to replace the service. For more information, and a chance to give your views, follow this link

20mph limits

I have been pressing the Council to update its policy on speed limits for some time. The head of the Highways department has now confirmed to me that he is reviewing the Council's policy on 20mph limits and has promised to update me soon. I hope I will have something positive to report in the autumn.

Budget

At the last meeting of the County Council's Scrutiny Committee we started the job of looking at the administration's budget proposals. I compared years of cuts to boiling a frog in a pan of cold water; I asked whether we are really taking a joined-up strategic approach to what we do as a council; and I asked what are we doing to measure the long term impact of cuts on people in the county. I don't think I got particularly convincing answers to any of my questions but they are ones I will keep asking. You can watch my questions and the answer online here from one hour, four minutes in (I'm surprised that the chair let me take so long to ask the question but I am grateful that he did because I was trying to get at some big issues). If you want to watch the whole discussion it starts 12 minutes into the video.

Special Educational Needs and Disability

At the same committee meeting, Daniel Elmer, the deputy Cabinet Member in charge of Children's Services, answered questions. Daniel is intelligent and thoughtful and his replies about delays to processing Education and Healthcare Plans (EHCPs) are the closest I have heard anyone from County Hall come to admitting that things are not working well. You can watch Daniel's comments on the same video link as above – they start one hour and 32 minutes in.
