



Cley Marshes Land Purchase Appeal

Norfolk Wildlife Trust has launched a ± 1 million appeal to raise money for purchase of 143 acres of land adjoining their Cley Marshes reserve.

When this land on the north Norfolk coast suddenly came on the market, all eyes fell on NWT. Situated next to the Trust's world-famous nature reserve, Cley Marshes, with

Salthouse Marshes on the other side, it spurred much excitement and expectation among membership, the Norfolk public and bird watchers around the world, wondering what the Trust would do.

NWT rose to the challenge to protect Norfolk's wildlife but they need everyone's help to make this possible. This is the biggest appeal in the Trust's 86 year history, and probably the most important.

Chief Executive, Brendan Joyce said 'We have 22 months to raise one million pounds. While it may seem a long time, this is an incredible challenge alongside restoring and protecting the 10,000 acres currently in our care'.

'Please help us make this once-in-a-generation purchase of an irreplaceable piece of land by donating to the appeal. Your donation, however small, is critical. We cannot let this chance go. This land creates a network of internationally vital habitats for many endangered species including marsh harrier, avocet, spoonbill, bearded tit and bittern'.

St Peter & St Paul's Church Please will you help?



(Extract from 'A Church Near You' website)

This is an amazing and beautiful building, and the roof is just stunning! Knapton is part of the Trunch Team. The beauty and history of this church is amazing. Remember too that there has been worship and prayer and praise in this building for hundreds of years. **You are welcome!** Come to a service, or just to admire the dedication and skill of the workmanship. The church of St. Peter & St. Paul is mainly 14th century although there is evidence of an earlier church which no doubt housed the impressive 13th century font.

The plain exterior gives no clue to the treasure of mediaeval carving which lies within. Knapton has one of the finest and most handsome of double hammer beam roofs in the country constructed in 1503. We do not know why this magnificent roof should have been added to such a plain church. The fine workmanship and superb carving is probably the work of London carpenters and may have been transported along the coast to nearby Mundesley. This would give some credence to local tradition which claims that the roof was built from a shipwreck at Mundesley.

The cemetery at Knapton contains the gravestone of Commander Jefferson Miles, RN, inscribed with the legend "the vindicator of Nelson." Commander Miles strenuously refuted claims made in Parliament in 1799 that Nelson had mistreated Republican prisoners while at Naples. In 1965 or thereabouts the then Bishop of Norwich said that Norfolk had too many churches and the amount was un-sustainable. He had a list drawn up of those churches that could be closed - we don't know if Knapton was one of those churches but without your support it we may eventually lose it!

Our beautiful church is in the heart of the village, a lovely building and one worth maintaining. You may not be a member of the congregation (although we will always welcome you warmly if you would like to join us), but it is still your church, where you celebrate marriages and births, say a final farewell to loved ones and celebrate Christmas and the Harvest.

The church needs regular maintenance if it is to remain open in the future. Our problem is that funds are tight (as they are everywhere at present) so even the smallest job has to be carefully considered. The small regular congregation keeps the church going on a week by week basis, but we are far too small a group to cope with ongoing maintenance. At a recent get together over coffee, one of the current parish councillors suggested that a group of volunteers might help clear the right side of the churchyard. If we had a team of regular willing volunteers, other needy jobs could also be carried out around the church.

Could it be 'Use It or Lose It?'

The 1965 closure list disappeared when that bishop moved on, but with the cut in monies coming in to the Diocese of Norwich from local congregations, savings have had to be made. In Swafield, the church is now closed for services, and the Parochial Church Council has joined with Trunch. Bradfield Church may possibly close in the near future (they already close during the winter as they have no electricity); the Trunch Team, which was the first of its kind, has been split; the villages of Thorpe Market, Antingham and Southrepps have joined Poppyland because one full time priest's post in the Repps Deanery had to be cut to save money; and David Bartlett from Trunch Team, who lives in Southrepps, has now taken over the Poppyland Group, which leaves the seven churches in the Trunch Team with only one full time priest, The Revd. Rod Key.

Please don't let this happen to our church. If you can volunteer to help in any way, we would love to hear from you. The more volunteers we have the lighter the load. To offer your help, please call me on the number below.
