
St Peter and St Paul's Parish Church Update







The Mundesley Hospital

"How often have you noticed Mundesley Hospital in the distance and wondered about it?"

Over the years it has appeared busy, derelict, busy, deserted and busy again. So I thought I'd find out a bit more, for it's a lovely (in the main) colonial style building, facing South, sheltered from the North and a long way from any busy road.

It was in the 1820's that Tuberculosis was identified as a single disease and in due course open air treatment was recognised in England as being effective. So one thing led to another and in 1898 Boulton and Paul of Norwich built Mundesley Sanatorium which was then established by one Dr F. W. Burton-Fanning as a TB sanatorium for Norwich. Being private it was only affordable to the wealthy. It was built as it now stands, in timber prefabricated sections and was the first large centre in England for the open air treatment of the disease.

It had fifteen bedrooms facing South, rounded corners to prevent dust accumulation, linoleum floors and special wall covering to allow for easy wiping. Water came from a well and it had electricity even to the long outside verandahs so patients could spend maximum time in the fresh air.

The legendary golfer Harry Vardon got TB when he was 33 and was fast tracked into Mundesley in 1903 and spent several months there. His time was not wasted for he made at least some recovery and helped design the Mundesley Golf Course.

During WW2 the hospital was relocated to Cheshire, returning after the war. TB treatment then continued until 1957 by which time convalescent treatment was overtaken by therapeutic drugs as the answer. So the

NHS took over the hospital and turned it into a convalescent and rehabilitation unit. In 1973 an additional block was built for remedial treatment and a physiotherapy block was built in 1975. It provided physiotherapy, speech and occupational therapy and 'remedial gymnastics', whatever that was.

How many times have you heard someone say, 'My dad was in Mundesley for a while after his operation'.

In 1992 it closed. It gradually fell into disrepair, and that is how it was when I came to live here and saw the sorry state into which it had undeservedly fallen. It was then put up for sale.

Along came Adapt Ltd. a charitable company who spent a great deal of money on converting the hospital into a rehab centre for people suffering from drink and drug problems. It opened as such in 1997 and called itself The Diana Princess of Wales Treatment Centre for Drug and Alcohol Problems. I remember hearing scare stories then. How would such a place affect property prices? Who would be at loose in our midst? And so on. But by all accounts it carried out excellent and unobtrusive work.

Sadly Administrators were called in during 2008 and it ceased its business in 2009 when 19 patients had to be transferred elsewhere. It had run out of funding. And that was the end of that. Once again it was deserted and sad. It was then briefly acquired by a homeopathic practitioner who never opened it and put it back on the market in 2010 at a guide price of £1.3m.

Then in 2014 along came Leigh Allison the owner of Newall Civil Engineering Ltd and Newall Construction Ltd of Norfolk and Elijah Adeyemi the owner of Norvic Healthcare (Anglia) Ltd. Together they formed Hope Community Healthcare Ltd and bought the site.

Over the period of two years and opening in February 2016 Hope have now transformed the hospital. For it is now a fully functioning privately owned mental health hospital with 27 beds for residential patients. Six more 'beds' are due to be completed soon. It employs about 60 clinical staff and 5 doctors.

In practice it currently caters in the main for NHS patients as a form of overspill from local hospital foundation trusts as well as other psychiatric hospitals elsewhere. It has been set up as a hospital with the emphasis on tailor made provision of care. They tell me that it seeks to focus on holistic opportunities as well as conventional medication whilst it supports and treats patients whose conditions include chronic depression, schizophrenia and paranoia. Patients, who are probably in the acute stage, would normally stay for three to five weeks before a managed discharge home.

Privately paying patients can of course be accommodated, and a referral by a GP acting in concert with a person's medical insurance would be the conventional access outside the NHS.

The hospital is managed by Sue Howlett, to whom I'm greatly indebted, for she and Catherine Wedge-Clarke, who is the communications manager, were kind enough to meet me at the hospital and tell me of all the hard work that has clearly been done to create the strikingly impressive and cheerful environment.

The hospital needs volunteer help. This will include gardening, running the tuck shop, befriending a patient for a short period. It is important work. I'm sure many of us might find it worthwhile to help, so do call the hospital.

So good luck to the enterprise. Let us all hope that the hospital will never again become a rather unhappy, empty and crumbling shell. Who knows, perhaps one day another patient like Harry Vardon might come along and design nine more holes for the golf course!


